## Presidents Message

We returned from our 99<sup>th</sup> BGHS September 2003 Annual Reunion to learn that the USAF, in its infinite wisdom, decided that the 15th Air Force along with the 21st AF, was not in the present plans of the USAF. The 15th AF will be called the 15th Air Expeditionary unit, reporting to the 18th Air Force located at Scott AFB, IL, the Headquarters for a major command related to transportation. We (the 99th BGHS) had a tour of that base during our St. Louis reunion in 1995. It's a very nice base and can undoubtedly handle its new units, but then so could Travis AFB or March AFB. Fifty years ago the 18th Air Force was the troop carrier Air Force, and part of the Tactical Air Command with the Headquarters 18th Air Force stationed at Donaldson AFB, Greenville, SC, and units scattered all over the United States, from Miami International Airport, FL, to Larson AFB in the state of Washington. Our Associations (both the 99th BGHS and 15th Air Force Association) will not be in good shape without the tremendous support provided by Travis AFB in the past, and then March AFB when it was Headquarters for 15th Air Force, but we will have to live with it. We did it before when some of the units in England got all of the publicity (It's still the same old story the Eighth gets all the glory).

But we, the 99th BGHS, have enough challenges without borrowing some from the 15<sup>th</sup> Air Force Association. We need to get our individual histories on tape and get our memorabilia gathered together in order to preserve it. My greatest concern in that area is that if we do nothing, our grandchildren will do it for us, and most of it will be lost forever, as they have no great concern for old items pertaining to an era they know little or nothing about. Most high school history books have very little reference to WWII. At our recent Reunions and by mail several of you have provided materials to Gary T. Staffo or Jerry Buckingham who have taken the lead in trying to preserve, organize and share our 99<sup>th</sup> BG history with a wider and new audience. Working closely with and building upon the outstanding historical research done by Dick Drain for the 99<sup>th</sup> BG and the 5<sup>th</sup> Bomb Wing they are trying to fill in some of the gaps and they are pressing forward with great ideas as demonstrated by the 2004 B-17 Flying Fortress Historical Calendar that was unveiled in Colorado Springs to rave reviews. Do not wait until later, do it now, send in your material or contact Gary or Jerry and they will preserve your materials for posterity for the 99<sup>th</sup> BGHS or work with you to make copies. At the last several reunions our members have brought in photos, scrapbooks, orders, patches, letters, and other memorabilia that Gary and Jerry have preserved for our history. Some of this donated material has already been shared with you in our Newsletter and much more is on the way. They take painstaking care of these original materials and where requested they are safely returned to the owner after duplication.

Another concern is finding a member(s) to be the on-site sponsor for the location of our Spring 2004 Mini Reunion. Our 2004 Annual Reunion hosted by Jim LaVey will be held near Baltimore, MD, and we would like for the Mini Reunion to be on the West coast or closer to the Central US. Several locations have been mentioned, such as Dallas, TX; Wright Patterson AFB, OH; Wichita, KS; and the Los Angeles, CA, area. The final decision will be determined by where we can find the member(s) to volunteer as sponsor(s) and our Site Selection Committee recommendation led by Jules Horowitz and Arkie Clark. If you have ever wanted to have a Mini Reunion in your local area now is the time to volunteer and contact Jules or Arkie to discuss your thoughts and find out how the 99<sup>th</sup> BGHS can help you make this happen. **WORK WITH OUR COMMITTEE** as Jules and Arky can provide the sponsor(s) with all the assistance necessary to help make this event happen.

## FIRST FLIGHT



My Dad, George Sr., was a ground crew member of the 347<sup>th</sup> BS and for some time now I have been following up with members of the 99<sup>th</sup> BG, especially the ground crew, to help preserve some of their stories and their contributions for the 99<sup>th</sup> BG history. This story has survived 60 years and had to be 'dusted' when it was taken off the shelf. Thanks to memory and diaries of Lloyd Averill and several others, the following was under the dust;

When the war was over and the world calmed down, Lloyd Averill, crew chief of the 347<sup>th</sup> did what everyone seemed to be doing, got married, raised a family, and the memory of a first flight had faded away until he was asked this question a couple of years ago, "What ever happened to that old B-17 of yours?" During the course of answering that question, Lloyd shared his story.

It's a safe bet more than one member of a ground crew considered signing up for gunnery school, and when they saw familiar faces of the flight crews finishing up their 50 mission tour and heading home, they thought about it a little harder. It wasn't the illusion of the grass being greener. It wasn't the balance of flying 50 combat missions vs. being overseas away from home the duration of the war. It was generic curiosity and sometimes words aren't enough. Sometimes the only way to answer a question is first hand experience. There are occasions when we toss caution aside and forget what curiosity did to the cat. Some spoke of the idea but very few carried through to the point of joining their brothers in the air. Lloyd Averill, crew chief of the 347<sup>th</sup>, thought about it and then took a first flight on a combat mission.

The idea was nothing new to Lloyd. One of the first things he did when the ground element caught up with the 99<sup>th</sup> Bomb Group at Navarin, Algeria was ask about joining a flight crew. He was told his services as a crew chief were more in demand and so his visions of flying in combat were postponed, but not forgotten. After the Group had moved on to

Oudna Field, Tunisia, the "flying bug" bit again. Pilot Jim Hager was down to two missions left and informed Lloyd he would have to decide soon if he wanted to fly with him. Jim recalled, "Averill figured I would have to make it back on my 49<sup>th</sup> and chose to join us on that one."

Some crews were dead serious on mission mornings, but Hager's crew was a happy-go-lucky lot. They seemed more like kids getting together for a game of baseball rather than a bomber crew about to fly into harms way. Jim was an original with the group, but the crew was among the early expansion to the 99<sup>th</sup>, having arrived in late June, just in time for the hornet's nest at Gerbini on July 5<sup>th</sup>. Most of them had over 20 missions completed when Lloyd joined them on the B-17F # 4229480 "Cotton Eyed Joe" for the September 4<sup>th</sup> mission to bomb the airdrome at Capodichino, Italy.

It wasn't uncommon for ground crew personnel to fly during the slow timing of a new engine, a shake down flight after repairs, or if a new pilot was being checked out. However, to hop on a combat mission without authorization created ulcers and furrowed brows among the brass. Those were hectic days in the 99<sup>th</sup> and the last thing needed was someone not following protocol and having an unauthorized person fly on a combat mission, so...

After preflight Lloyd grabs a parachute and joins the navigator and bombardier in the nose. The time to back out has come and gone and all those questions he had about flying a combat mission are about to be answered as they roll out and finally take off. The climb, assembly, and run to the IP went as briefed, but weather became a factor near the target. The diary accounts of copilot Bill Pixler and navigator Jack Beard indicate the target was soaked in, no bomb drop. There is no mention of a secondary, tertiary, or opportune target. But it was no cakewalk for the newcomer.

Even light flak can be a terror if it's accurate and for the first time in combat it's always too close. The good news was there was no flak hits noted despite some near misses. Some say it's not possible to sweat at altitude. They probably haven't flown through flak.

Lloyd wanted the dollar tour and when a few fighters showed up he got his money's worth. The group was still tucked in close when 109s made a couple of flaring passes from the front of the formation. Lloyd remembers firing one of the cheek guns, "I don't think I hit anything, but I sure tried." 109 drivers were seldom desperate enough to bust into a tight herd of 17s, and no one was disappointed when they broke off to look for easier hunting elsewhere.

Back at Oudna after the adrenaline died down Lloyd thought, "If we had been shot down I would have been AWOL!" The "combat flying bug" was swatted and Lloyd was promoted on to flight chief, content to ride out the war on the ground. Hager finished his 50<sup>th</sup> the following day; the rest of the crew would complete their tour in due time. There is always one mission that seems to be special, the first, the last, the best, or the worst. Lloyd now had his all rolled up in one. Sometimes you just have to take the first flight.


### Raymond E. Murray 348<sup>th</sup> BS 09/15/2003

I am writing to honor a great guy who passed away on September 15<sup>th</sup>, 2003 in Brewerton, New York at the age of 87. His name was Raymond E. Murray, the Ball Turret Gunner on my crew with the 99<sup>th</sup> Bomb Group, 348<sup>th</sup> Bomb Squadron.

I had lost contact with Ray from July in 1944 when he and most of the original crew came home before me due to my having Malaria and I got behind 8 missions that kept me in Foggia until August 3, 1944. I found Ray through the 99<sup>th</sup> BGHS Newsletter in 1999, 55 years later. We have been in close contact for the past four years and we relived those missions to Ploesti, Wiener-Neustadt and the shuttle mission to Poltava, Russia and all the others including the R&R on the Isle of Capri in June, 1944.

Here is a picture of Ray posing beside his Ball Turret that he loved. In our opinion he was not only one of the best Ball Turret Gunners in the 348<sup>th</sup>, but his constant information on in-coming Messerschmitts saved our lives many times.

## On the Home Front With Amy Buckingham

Here is a great recipe from Jeanne Sholtis that I sampled at the Colorado Reunion. This will be great for coffee time and cold winter days ahead. It's very flexible; because many varied fruits and nuts can be added. Enjoy!

### Bread or Muffins - any flavor

- ¾ cup orange juice
- 2 tbsp. oil
- 1 egg
- 1-cup sugar
- 1-cup fruit or nuts-see note below
- 2 cups flour
- ½ tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. baking soda

Grease a loaf pan or muffin tins well. Mix orange juice, oil, egg, and sugar, add fruit or nuts and mix. Stir together the flour, salt and baking soda. Stir all together. Spoon the batter into a loaf pan or muffin tins. Bake loaf at 350 degrees for 60 minutes or until done. Bake muffins at 400 degrees for 15 minutes.

### Variations-

- 1/2 pt. blueberries or raspberries – fresh or frozen
- 1 20 oz. can crushed pineapple (drained)
- 3 bananas- chopped slightly, plus walnuts and raisons to taste
- 1 cup dried dates-soaked a bit to make softer-and nuts as desired
- 1 cup cranberries-about ½ pound
- May add nuts to any recipe above as desired

Thank you Jeanne, I love the variety of fruits that can be used with this one basic recipe. You may want to try other fruits as they are in season or available.

### Remember When?

- \*There were no silk stockings available and ladies used brown suntan lotion for the stocking color and eyebrow pencil for the seams.
- \*Hemlines were below the knees during the war and went above the knees when the boys came home.
- \*Rationing was an everyday word for items such as gas, sugar, coffee, and leather shoes.
- \*Billie Bacher remembers donating all her rationing stamps to her mother for leather shoes for her baby sister who was growing rapidly and needed them. Billie remembers wearing the plastic and wooden shoes that were nearly worn out by just putting them on.
- \*Marge Swingen worked at Nash Motors, Kenosha, WI for \$14.75 per week. Before the war they built Nash cars, during the war they tested airplane engines.
- \*Betty Kidwiler remembers grownups talking about the war and nearly scaring her to death. She lived in SE Kansas near Ft. Riley where planes were flying constantly and trainloads of troops made the war very real.
